Fine Arts

Art students are wrapping up the year with their final projects. Studio Art students have a 3D focus on mask making and creative hat construction and are also collaborating with our Urban Art Club to complete a Social Justice graffiti mural that will be installed in the Art Yard, just outside of the art rooms.

In May and June, Studio in Crafts will be working on warm glass fusing with master glass artist, Tony Serviente. Drawing and Painting students are finishing their expressive botanical compositions on untraditional surfaces (cabinet doors, shutters etc.). They will be mounted in the Art garden just down the hall from D hallway. The Photo students will also feature their work at the annual Photo Exhibit at the IHS Library at the end of May through June 2014.

AP Studio Art students are designing their own projects, some working further with their Concentration theme and some working with the AP Art History students to recreate a master art work using models and props to bring art to life on a human scale. These recreations will be photographed by the Digital Photo students and included in the annual IHS Visual Culture art show. This year, that annual exhibit at the Tompkins County Public Library will feature paintings, drawings, prints, ceramics and mixed media work from IHS art students, July-August 2014.

All Algebra I students have Regents exams on the following days:

Common Core: Periods 1-3, June 3rd

Integrated Algebra: 8:45 am, June 20th

Students should bring pencil, pen and a graphing calculator – but not their phone. Cell phones are expressly forbidden during all Regents Exams. In addition, Honors Algebra I students (only) will have an in-class supplemental final exam on June 5th and 6th.

All Algebra I students are required to take both exams.

LEGO Mindstorms Robotics: Thanks to a grant from Toshiba America Foundation, Ms. Kolhatkar's students have been building and programming working robots out of LEGO's latest EV3 sets in AIS math lab this spring (when their work is done, of course).

Competitions: In February, about 200 Ithaca High students challenged themselves by participating in the American Math Competition run by the Mathematical Association of America. We were very proud to have eight of our students qualify for the even more challenging American Invitational Math Exam that was held in March: Alexander Babiak, Gayathri Ganesan, Daniel Halpern, Rex Lei, Jensen Lo, Dekang Meng, Raymond Xu and Aryeh Zax.

Also in March, Ithaca High School took first place at the 26th annual High School Programming Contest at St. Bonaventure University. Congratulations to our amazing team: Aryeh Zax, Connor Simpson, Jensen Lo, and Rex Lei! In April, there was another programming contest at Cornell, organized by Fred Deppe of the Ithaca High School Mathematics Department and Robbert Van Renesse of the Cornell Computer Science Department. The teams that came in first and third for the Cornell University High School Programming Contest were both from Ithaca High! The winning team: Rex Lei, Jensen Lo, Aryeh Zax; the third place team: Gayathri Ganesan, Connor Simpson, Jesse Yuan.

Also in April, the Ithaca High School Math Team took third place in their division at NYSML (**New York State Mathematics League**). Congratulations are in order to all of the students and extra kudos to Rex Lei who was the high scorer for our team, correctly answering 9 out of 10 questions in the individual round. The High School students were joined by several from DeWitt and Boynton as well: Eric Dusenberry, Reynold Gao, Vivek Myers, Yuuki Real, Felix Shi, and Justin Tan.

The physics classes at the Ithaca High School will be going to Darien Lake to do experiments on the amusement park rides on May 19. It's a great opportunity for students to use their understanding of physics as it relates to their own physical experiences. For the Regents classes, it is an excellent review of basic mechanics in preparation for the Regents exam.

AP Physics classes have completed their Collegeboard exams and are starting projects. We also will begin a series of talks by various scientists on areas of research relating to physics including special relativity, the Brachistrone problem, particle physics, biophysics, magnetism, fluids, astrophysics, theoretical physics, nanotechnology and other topics. In addition, AP Physics B classes will be doing a workshop with Cornell graduate student Stacy Farina on the physics of fish. AP Physics C classes will be doing a workshop with Cornell graduate student Michael Lam on Exoplanets, Life in the universe, Pulsars and Cosmology.

A new series of talks this year at the high school was aimed at introducing students, families, and faculty to the applications of the basic sciences typical of high school and middle school classes. We had four talks this year and plan on a full roster of talks next year beginning in the fall. Talks were held from 5:30-6:30 PM in H Courtyard, an intimate setting that encourages conversations with the visiting speakers. We started with a talk by Chris Schaffer of Cornell on the use of laser technology for imaging living biological systems. We saw movies of blood traveling through the blood vessels and learned how this technology is being used to better understand Alzheimer's disease. Bruce Monger from Cornell helped us better understand how the rise in atmospheric CO₂ is affecting our oceans and what we can do to change this situation. Hod Lipson from Cornell told us all about 3-D printing and the many current and possible future applications of this technology with an emphasis on how it is revolutionizing industries. Finally, last month Lena Kourkoutis from Cornell regaled us with stories from the nano-world, explaining how electrons are used to image man-made and biological systems and the importance of understanding the behavior of materials at this minute scale.

We expect to begin our series next year with a talk from Bruce Monger from Ithaca College on how recommender systems are used by such sites as Google and Netflix. He plans to tell us how the computer programming is done to make these systems. Look for the full series information early in the fall.

Languages
Department

IHS senior Alexander Babiak is one of four students chosen for the first American team that will compete in the 12th International Linguistics Olympiad (IOL) in Beijing this July. Alex was one of 1,645 students who competed in January in the Open Round of the NACLO (North American Computational Linguistics Olympiad) contest, held locally at Cornell. The top ten percent of scorers were invited to the Invitational Round in March. As one of the top four scorers in that round, Alex will represent the US on the first of its two 4-person teams in China this summer.

Students had a range of problems to solve in these contests, involving languages such as Estonian, Maori, Cameroon Pidgin English, Turkish, Hungarian and more, as well as analysis of English from computational perspectives. Alex has studied German and Latin, both through the AP level, at IHS, as well as Ancient Greek (he's currently reading Homer), and numerous languages on his own in his spare time. Congratulations, Alex!

Once again, the IHS Latin students performed successfully on the National Latin Exam, given in March. Students performed "with distinction" (cum laude), "with great distinction" (magna cum laude), "with greatest distinction" (maxima cum laude, or Silver Medal), and "with highest distinction" (summa cum laude, or Gold Medal).

In Latin 1, there were 3 Gold Medalists and 3 Silver Medalists: Claire Derry, Julia Miller, and Cecilia Yearsley (Gold); Sarah Cohn-Manik, Rowan Cusack Miller, and Lena Weiss (Silver). Two students performed with great distinction: Maddie Crooker and Fisher Michaels. Four achieved with distinction: Maya George, Colleen Gorsky, Tuli Kuckes, and Max Shuhan.

In Latin 2, Andrew Robertson and Lehman Schwab won Gold Medals; Sarah Couillard won Silver; and Emily Pelliccia achieved with great distinction.

In Latin 3, Joseph Lunine and Phoebe Shalloway won Gold; Ben Sherman won Silver; and Jelle Schukken performed with great distinction.

Phoebe Lakin won her fourth straight Gold Medal, for Latin 5 this year. Like Phoebe, several students have won awards every time they've participated: 3 medals in a row, for Phoebe, Joseph and Ben (Latin 3), and two in a row, for Andrew and Lehman (Latin 2).

With DiCamillo's quotation in mind, students in the two sections of Readers' Workshop at the high school have been paired with reading buddies in Chris Bell and Abigail Bokaer's first grade classes at Fall Creek Elementary School. The buddy pairs have exchanged letters of introduction, and will meet at least twice to read to each other and play on the Fall Creek playground. Through a generous grant from IPEI, the high school students will be tasked with determining the interests and relative reading levels of their buddies, and will then conduct research on children's books and choose an appropriate book to match the interests and level of their first grade buddy. Readers' Workshop students will purchase a book for their first grade buddies, to be inscribed and presented at the final meeting.

Ms. McKown has reported that, once again, the annual Victorian Tea was a great success. English 10 Combined students waltzed, drank tea, and looked quite refined.

This spring, English teachers and students were treated to two wonderful theatrical performances. After meeting in small workshops for an introduction to acting and the play, nearly 300 11th graders visited Ithaca College to enjoy a special performance of Arthur Miller's *The Crucible*.

Mr. Byrne's AP Lit class has been work-shopping *Antigone* with local theater group Civic Ensemble. The students have acted out and improved scenes from the play, watched a 45 minute staged reading and will rewrite select scenes for an in-class performance. It has been a wonderfully creative post-exam two weeks. We look forward to continuing to cooperate with local theaters in order to bring even more live performances to IHS's students.

Students who have enrolled in AP English courses for next year should listen to announcements and attend an after-school meeting at which they will pick up their summer reading and writing assignments.

Physical Education & Health Department

As the warm weather finally reaches Ithaca, we want to remind students that they are expected to be prepared to participate in PE class, whether it is held indoors or outdoors. We recommend students wear comfortable clothes that are appropriate to be active in, which includes shorts or sweat pants, T-shirts, and possibly long sleeved shirts or hoodies if it is cooler out, and remember: **Sneakers are a MUST!**

The goal of our Physical Education Classes are to keep students participating towards lifelong fitness in a safe and healthy environment, so please remind students that they will not be allowed to participate in class without appropriate attire. It is important that each student attends his or her PE class and is prepared to participate because passing Physical Education is a New York State requirement in order to graduate.

Many students were issued PE locks at the beginning of the year. It is the responsibility of the student to ensure that their locker is cleaned out of all materials by June 17, 2014 and the correct lock is placed on their assigned locker. If the student is unable to produce the assigned lock, a letter will be sent home requesting \$10 for a replacement lock. Again these locks are provided to students to ensure the safety of their valuables (when they use the locks correctly). Please encourage students to be proactive in removing their belongings. We had a huge amount of clothing and sneakers left behind by students last year.

When the PE staff attends our continuing education conferences, we find out useful information we like to share with students and their families. Some more recent findings passed on from our professional organization, NYS AHPERD (**New York State Alliance for Health Physical Education Recreation and Dance**), were:

The New England Journal of Medicine reports for the first time in two centuries, the current generation of children in America may have shorter life expectancies than their parents.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention report that physically active students have better learning, readiness, attention span, fewer behavior issues, hence the capacity for better academic outcome.

Thank you for your continued support for your students and their success in PE, Health and all of their other classes at IHS.
